

Antony Gormley's Field for the British Isles consists of 40,000 small clay figures and was made by 100 people of all ages from St Helens in Merseyside, in collaboration with Tate Gallery, Liverpool in 1993. At its inception in 1993 the work received immediate international acclaim. Field was purchased for the Arts Council Collection in 1995 with the support of The Henry Moore Foundation and the National Art Collections Fund. It inhabits large and unused spaces. Before being shown in London at the

Hayward Gallery in 1996 it filled a British Rail site in Gateshead. In Colchester, this host of hand-sized terracotta figures has invaded a former department store. Field makes us conscious of the act of looking and challenges our ideas about the artist and the artwork and how we usually experience them. Wherever the work is shown it is installed by people from that particular community investing it with a new touch. Our gaze is held by an expanse of colour, a landscape of new possibilities a different world.


Field for the British Isles is part of a global project in which the earth of a particular region is given form by a group of local people of all ages. It is made of 25 tons of clay energised by fire, sensitised by touch and made conscious by being given eyes. **ANTONY GORMLEY**

A Roman road once ran across the site at 17-23 Queen Street. Now named Roman House it has been used as a location for trade since early this century. During the 17TH and 18TH centuries the site was residential and the housing dated from Medieval and Tudor times. Between 1904 and 1929 a tramline was in operation along Queen street and by the mid-1920s the site housed a courtyard of traders including a Baker, a Garage, a Vet and a Blacksmith. The current premises were used as a supermarket and department store during the 1970s and 1980s.
