The summer season at Tate St Ives is dominated by the sculptor Antony Gormley in a memorable presentation of four compelling sculptures in an exhibition entitled Some of the Facts. Antony Gormley is one of Britain's most important sculptors and this exhibition touches on the major themes of human experience. This is the largest display by a single artist to be presented at Tate St Ives and illustrates the broader exhibition plans for the gallery to show major figures in British Art alongside the artists connected with the St Ives context.

Gallery 1

Bed (1981) is constructed from 12,000 slices of bread arranged in layers out of which the artist has eaten the volume of his body in two halves and refers to the idea of stratification as in 'bedrock'. This work is shown in the context of paintings by Peter Lanyon, Karl Weschke, William Scott, Bryan Wynter, Sandra Blow, Roger Hilton and Wilhelmina Barns-Graham.

Antony Gormley Critical Mass

This sculpture explores a range of ideas about the physical and metaphysical self, and the body in relation to history and place. Critical Mass (1995) is a group of over sixty life-size figures, cast in iron from the artist's own body. The installation in the circular gallery is dramatric and architectonic.

Field for the British Isles (1992) is a mesmerising work, containing forty thousand diminutive figures. It was made by a group of people in St Helens, Merseyside, who were invited by Gormley to form clay into figures which were then fired and placed as a crowd in the gallery space. Each person was invited to form the work in their hands and consequently each figure is unique, deriving its scale and shape from the hand of the person making it.
