
ANTONY GORMLEY

Each sculpture Antony Gormley has made appears to take a very different form. However, he has had a constant concern with two underlying qualities of the object: the surface or skin, and the inner structure, which is revealed by accretion or by carving away. In 'Fruits of the Earth', 1979, for instance, a loaded revolver, machete, and bottle are covered with layers of lead until they resemble organic shapes. 'End Product' 1979 is the base of an elm tree carved, burnt and sawn. In this exhibition, he will show a number of recent works.

Antony Gormley was born in 1950. He studied anthropology, archaeology and art at Cambridge and started making sculpture after travelling widely in India and the Near East. This is his first one-man exhibition since leaving the Slade School of Art in 1979.
